I had the idea of 'Hearts and Minds' because when people have problems with their hearts that incapacitate them physically for days, months and sometimes even for life I wanted people to be aware that they could keep their brain active and that using chess as one of the greatest mind games ever will be of great benefit.

I use my love of chess as the vehicle to do this and the Management at Castle Quay Shopping Centre were very generous in granting me the free use of a unit for the event.




HEARTS AND MINDS CHESSATHON

When I got home I did not hit the bed immediately as I was still on a high and my brain was racing. Now it is all over and I must ensure that the money is paid to the hospital so they can get on with putting it to good use.


